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Introduction:

Govt. Michael Madhusudan (M M) College, Jashore, is a famous and well-known college of the south-west region of Bangladesh. It is ranked as *A* grade college and possessed an outstanding position in the ranking by National University for several times. It was established in July 1941 naming *Jessore college* as Non-govt. College and later it is renamed after the great Bengali epic poet Michel Madhusudan Dutta.

Since its establishment, the college has been playing an important role in the field of coeducation, culture, sports and co-curricular activities. The institution was nationalized in May 1968. It has a vision to prepare world-class students. Looking forward to its goals, it has set its mission to ensure sustainable and quality education. It prioritizes to ensure regular theoretical and practical classes following the syllabus and using modern information and communication technology. It also prioritizes to implement extra-curricular activities successfully, to ensure regular attendance of the teachers, students and staffs; and finally, to apply standard evaluation system and effective monitoring system.

It has a total surface of 22.86 acres having a large playground and wide open space in the front of the Arts Building. It has five water bodies and two ponds. The campus has a fully well-protected enclosure with boundary wall and thorny wire. Recently, the entire campus has been beautified with different colorful flowers. The institution has a glorious history with the Great Language Movement of 1952, Education Movement of 1962, Mass Upheaval of 1969 and the Great Liberation War of 1971 of Bangladesh. Our teachers and students participated in those movements and war. They sacrificed their lives and embraced martyrdom in Liberation War in 1971. From its inception, teachers and students Teachers and for a long time the college could not develop according to the need of this area. Now we are trying our best to develop the college. To materialize the government policy and to estabeducation, we need digital classroom, diverse professional and ICT lish digital-based based training for teachers and staffs. We need to improve the quality of teaching and learning environment, to improve teaching and managerial capacity of college staff, to establish internet facilities and connectivity in campus and to introduce soft skills programs and other innovative academic programs. But it's a matter of regret that we are facing financial problems to materialize those programs because of our college fund and the allotted government fund is not sufficient. So, it is our fervent appeal to the government for allocating sufficient grants to materialize government policy and programs. In conclusion, we hope to improve co-education in the south-west region of our country and expect more that it will render a great contribution to our national development.

Establishment

Government Michael Madhusudan College, the reputed government college in South-Western Bengal is located in the heart of Jashore city which is the first prosperous district of British India in trade and commerce, holds significant importance from a geographical perspective. Since its establishment in 1941, the college has been playing a pivotal role in the realm of education, culture, games & sports. However, before the division of the country, the idea of establishing a first-class college at the district headquarter started from the backwardness of higher education in the district. In this context, the son of Ganganandapur village of Jhikargacha upazila of the district, member of the West Bengal State Parliament and professor of Kolkata Bangavasi College, Mr. Mohitosh Roy Chowdhury took the initiative to establish the college. The first meeting to establish the college was held in August 1940 with local dignitaries. Rai Bahadur Shri Keshablal Chowdhury, President of Jessore Municipality Surendranath Halder and the then District Judge S. K. Gupta (ICS) an executive committee consisting of 34 members was formed with Shri Kshitinath Ghosh as the genaral secretary. Another general committee of 150 members was formed to popularize the plan to establish the college.

According to the decision of the executive committee, the initiative to establish the college took its final shape in July 1941. It was necessary to procure land and buildings for the college. The executive committee for acquisition of land and buildings proposed to Shri Keshablal Roy Chowdhury, president of the medical institute and Purna Gopal Bose, secretary, to donate their unused land and buildings (as the medical institute failed to get recognition) for the college. Responding to the call of the Executive Committee, on 18th March 1941, they donated their assets of Rs.40, 000/- (worth of a one-storied and a two-storied building) for the college on 8 conditions. This resulted in the formal class activities of the college named 'Jessore College' in two buildings of the then Medical Institute adjacent to the Chuadanga Bus Stand in the city (adjacent to the western side of the present Fatima Hospital). Dr. Dhirendra Nath Roy was recruited as the principal of the college. According to a different source, 'Jesore College' was established in 1941 as part of the 'National Medical School and Hospital' established in 1922 at Sukhan Bibi's house under the supervision of Hazrat Garib Shah. The college started with 146 students (142 male and 4 female students, among them 109 Hindus and 37 Muslims) in the academic year 1941-1942.

When the educational environment was disturbed due to the setting up of Allied bases in the college during World War II, the college authorities temporarily shifted the college to the Hatbaria zamindar's kachari house (next to the present fire service office). In 1945, the college returned to its original location. In 1946, the land was donated by Babu Kshitinath Ghosh, Neelratan Dhar, Shri Vijaykrishna Roy, Shri Nagendranath Ghosh, Shri Vijay Roy,

Khan Bahadur Lutfar Rahman, Advocate Waliar Rahman, Advocate Abdur Rauf, Charuchandra Dutta, Rai Bahadur Keshablal Chowdhury, Shri Vishweshwar Sarkar, Danbir Shri Ranada Prasad Saha, Abdus Chubhan, Wazed Ali Ansari and others. However, the college was named after the great Bengali poet Michael Madhusudan Dutt of Jashore and named as 'Michael Madhusudan College' abbreviated as MM College.

Subsequently, on December 10, 1956, Md. Abdul Hai, the second son of the late Shah Sufi Maulana Muhammad Abul Khair (RA), Pir Saheb of Kharki, took over as the principal of the college. B.Com (Pass) and B.Sc (Pass) courses were started in the college during his time. In 1959, to increase the scope of the college, Md. Abdul Hai shifted the college from Chuadanga bus stand to its present location (Khadki Mauza) With the help of M. Ruhul Quddus, District Magistrate of Jessore and included it in the development plan of the then government. At that time, Pir Saheb of Kharki late Shah Sufi Maulana Muhammad Abul Khair (RA) and Haji Md. Morshed played a special role in collecting the land. However, the college illuminating light of education is standing on the land donated by Munsi Nasir Uddin, Md. Abdul Latif, Md. Mahatab Biswas, Md. Ali, Zabur Ali Joaddar, Md. Dalil Uddin, Sharif Shamchur Rahman, Md. Iman Ali, Abdus Chubahan etc.

In 1960, District Magistrate M. Rahul Quddus laid the foundation stone of 'Abdul Hai Kala Bhavan' (Abdul Hai Arts Building). In this regard, the contribution of the then professors of the college including Engineer Farooqui, Advocate Syed Shamsur Rahman, Advocate Roshan Ali, Pashupati Basu, Satish Kumar Dutta, Iman Ali Master, Shahid, Sudhir Kumar Ghosh, Professor Md. Sharif Hossain is particularly memorable. In 1962, the college opened its doors to higher education with the introduction of the first Honors Course in Bengali, Economics and Geography. Later Honors in History was introduced in 1963. The college was nationalized on 1 May 1968.

The college has a glorious history from the great language movement of 1952 to the education movement of 1958, the Mass Uprising of 1969 and the Great Liberation War of 1971. In addition, students of Government Michael Madhusudan College have played a leading role in all the democratic movements of the country. It has been possible to retrieve the names of the following freedom fighters who were martyred by the Pakistani hyenas and their local allies in the great liberation war. List of names of martyred freedom fighter among teachers and students in the below.

However, in the post liberation war, Science Club was established in the college in 1973 and Union of Commerce (Banijjo Samsad) was formed in 1976-1977. On September 1, 1976, Md. Abdul Hai took over as the principal and died on January 10, 1981. It should be noted that Md. Abdul Hai's contribution is the highest among those who have served as principal since the establishment of the college. Professor Md Sharif Hossain, the nephew of late Shah Sufi Maulana Mohammad Abul Khair (RA.) was appointed the principal of the college in December 1989. He played a special role in the overall development of the college, including the completion of the construction of the College Mosque and the launch of the 'Book Bank' project.

On October 31, 1991, Professor Kazi Md. Kamruzzaman took over as the principal of the college. In the academic year 1991-1992, Honors courses were introduced in the following 6 subjects: Physics, Botany, Mathematics, Chemistry, Management and Accounting. The first Masters course was opened in the college in the academic year 1992-1993. Honors course in English was introduced in the academic year 1995-1996. In 1997, higher secondary courses were withdrawn from the college. Later, in 2008, higher secondary courses were again started in the college. Honors courses in Political Science, Sociology, Philosophy, History, Islamic History and Culture, Islamic Studies and Zoology were introduced in the academic year 1997-1998. Currently, the college offers honors courses in 19 subjects and masters courses in 17 subjects. In 2021, ICT subject has been introduced at intermediate level.

At present, under the dynamic leadership of the incumbent principal of the college, Professor Morzina Akhter, the college is advancing uncompromisingly in the progress of multi-faceted development, education, technology, culture, sports and co-educational programs as well as academic excellence. The present college premises are decorated with colorful and aesthetic decorations of different flowers and plants. The florally decorated campus has created a pleasant environment for learning. The entire campus is under surveillance by CCTV cameras for round-the-clock which is financed by the College Education Development Project (CEDP). Under this project, modern learning technology 'Smartboard' has been added to 19 departments of the college. Laptops have been provided in every department. Besides, almost every department has multiple smart and multimedia classrooms. Tiled floors and airconditioned classrooms, reading rooms, seminar libraries create a unique learning environment. Modern lab facilities including floor tiling and air conditioning have been added to the science department laboratories. The college administration is regularly organizing in-house training on various subjects for continuous professional skill development of teachers and skill development of students. For this purpose, an ICT center has been modernized and a modern 'CEDP Training Center' has been established. The Central Library of the college has been modernized. Separate study zones have been made for teachers and students. Student Wi-Fi zone has been arranged. Modernization, renovation, refurbishment and interior decoration work is going on inside the library to beautify and beautify of the 'Bangabandhu and Muktijudda Corner'. With utmost emphasis on technology, all the information of the college is uploaded through digital notice board and dynamic website and all financial transactions, academic activities, paperless transactions are managed through advanced 'Management Information System (MIS)' system. Mail, Social Media Facebook, WhatsApp are used for communication and daily activities. Seminars are being held regularly in various departments and arrangements have been made to publish collections of articles. Digital attendance system is going to be introduced in higher secondary level and history department of the college. A 'Center for Students with Disabilities' has been established in the college campus to focus on and raise awareness about students with disabilities. Individual wash blocks, pure, safe and clean drinking water facilities and breast-feeding corners have been set up for the students of each building. The college has the facility of a round-the-clock medical center.

Vision, Mission and Objectives

Under the supervision MoE, DSHE, the National University, Gazipur and Jashore Board of Intermediate and Secondary Education the college is currently managing programs in higher secondary and, under graduate and graduate programs. Implementation of the Vision 2041 and the Delta Plan 2100, the college is imparting education to contribute the nation. With its focus on quality education, the dedicated faculty, staff, and employees of this college are working tirelessly.

Besides its contribution to education, the institution has secured a significant place in the nation's socio-economic and cultural development, both in Jashore and the country. Many dignitaries, including ministers, MPs, politicians, government officials, artists, poets, writers, journalists, actors, and sports personalities, have taken pride in their association with this prestigious educational establishment. Their presence at various events and celebrations has enriched the campus atmosphere.

Michael Madhusudan College envisions itself as a dynamic and pioneering institution committed to advancing education in the light of Bangladesh's rich history, the spirit of our Language movement, great liberation war, and the principles outlined in the Educational Policy of 2010. 1.1 Academic Departments and Programs

Currently Govt. Michael Madhusudan College, Jashore College runs 36 academic programs under 19 departments of which 19 is undergraduate programs and 17 are graduate programs. It got affiliated with National University in 1992 to run Degree (pass), Honors and Masters Programs, and later on got approval to open Masters preliminary programs.

Chapter 1: Overview of the College (Institutional and Academic)

Government Michael Madhusudan College, Jashore, is a distinguished institution located on Shah Abdul Karim Road, Kharki, Jashore. Established on July 1, 1941, and later provincialized on May 1, 1968, the college boasts a spacious campus spanning 22.86 acres, divided into a New Campus with 18.18 acres and an Old Campus with 4.68 acres. With a substantial volume of 92,511.13 sq.m. (110,642.4 sq.yd), the college is well-equipped with 165 teaching posts, 4 demonstrators, a librarian and an assistant librarian, a physical education teacher, and a diligent workforce of 3rd and 4th-class office employees. The college features a total of 5 buildings housing 51 classrooms and 56 toilets, along with 7 science labs and an integrated ICT lab, a teachers training centre. Additionally, there are 3 student common rooms, 6 halls of residence, 2 mosques, five water bodies and 2 ponds on the campus. There is a well decorated big library with huge number of updated books. It has a medical center from where students can receive treatment. The college ensures the transportation facility for the students. It has 3 Buses. The entire campus is under the surveillance of 75 CCTVs in different sports.

The college offers higher secondary classes in science, humanities, and business education, as well as various undergraduate and postgraduate programs. It also encourages co-curricular activities through organizations such as BNCC, Bandhan, Rover Scout, Ranger Guide, Red Crescent, clubs, debate, and cultural organizations. Moreover, the college has 42 multimedia classrooms, with 84 teachers proficient in their use and 95 capable of creating digital content, ensuring a modern and dynamic educational environment. The campus has a fully well protected enclosure with boundary wall and thorny wire. Recently, the entire campus has been beautified with different colorful flowers. The institution has a glorious history with the Great Language Movement of 1952, Education Movement of 1962, Mass Upheaval of 1969 and the Great Liberation War of 1971 of Bangladesh.

1.1: Governance and Teaching Structure

The college has two administrative posts (Principal & Vice Principal) and others are engaged in imparting education. There are 10 Professors, 36 Associate Professors, 56 Assistant Professors, 61 Lecturers, 00 Demonstrator, a Physical Teacher and a Librarian. Moreover, 38 Office Staffs are supporting the office for running the college smoothly.



Technological Development

The entire campus is under the surveillance of CCTV and facilitated by the internet connectivity and network. All sorts of financial transaction is completely cashless and paperless which is conducted through CMIS, website and mobile banking. Digital Notice board, social media and website are used to inform and disseminate information. Most of the classrooms are renovated, refurbished and equipped with AC and smart technological tools now.

Non-cognitive factors:

- Self-efficacy: Students believe in his/her own ability to succeed in a particular situation which is called self-efficacy has been developed a lot through counselling to face the challenges in technology oriented education system.
- Self-Control: Students are constantly encouraged by the teachers to develop the
 ability of controlling themselves and regulate their emotions, thoughts and behavior
 in the face of temptations and impulses as it is an executive functions, it is necessary
 for achieving specific goals.
- Motivation: Constant motivation is going on to actively take part in the process of learning as motivation involves biological, emotional, social and cognitive forces, teachers are constantly engaged in initialing and encouraging those faculties.
- The college arranges Seminar, discussion and other events for round the year. It organizes different types of social consciousness programs and events like anti-drug & rally, cleanliness week, cyber bulling, Breast cancer awareness program. Guardian's assembly is highly prioritized to increase students in the classes.

Publications:

The college has issued a compilation of seminar papers named *Seminar Prabandha Sangkalan*. Department like sociology has global standard Journal named *Social Thoughts*. Besides, college publishes magazine, college diaries, academic course plan regularly. Moreover, department publishes magazine and prospectus periodically.

2.2 Key Achievements and Highlights of the Year of the Department

All departments of the college individually arranged national & international seminars, discussion focusing on academic issues. The college centrally observes all national days according to the directions of MoE & DSHE. The college commemorating the birth anniversary of the father of the nation, Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman (17 March), 21 February (International Mother Language Day), 26 March (The Independence Day), 16 December Victory Day and another national Days. 15 August National Mourning Day. The departments organize debate, quiz, orientation program for the fresher's, motivation sessions of the students etc.

Academic:

• Classroom Performance: Classroom Performance is an example of student response system. It is the key of learning. It allows the students to take part actively in the process of learning. Still our students are less inquisitive. But we have been trying to encourage those asking questions which is most important factor of inquisitiveness. - Sports: After COVID-19 situation annual sports are not arranged but indoor game is going on. Recently the college is going to arrange out door games again.
- Cultural Activities : Different cultural activities are arranged in the year round.
- Social Activities: BNCC, Rover Scouts, Red Crescent arranged a blood donation camp
 in the last fiscal year. They also distributed warm clothes and blankets among the poor
 people in the last winter. Rover Scouts, Rangers and BNCC unit also play roles to keep
 the campus clean once a month, take part disciplinary activities and march past during the
 celebration of the national days.

2.4 Key Achievements and Highlights of the Year of Institutional Development Grants (IDG)




